- Did you know AAUW celebrated its 140<sup>th</sup> anniversary last year? I am proud to belong to an organization that has successfully navigated decades of change while staying focused on their vital mission of equity for women and girls. I wonder if the founders thought AAUW would still be around (and still needed) after such a long time!
- We are also celebrating the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Title IX, the federal law which prohibits discrimination in any federally funded educational program on the basis of gender. I sent you an email on December 18 about an event to be held in February at the high school to celebrate the profound impact this law has had on the lives of countless women and girls. That event has been moved to April. Please continue to send me any ideas for the event or personal experiences you or someone you know, have had that can help illustrate the power of this important law.
