As we continue our mission of working towards equity for women and girls, it's nice to start off with some bits of good news.

In 1900, Paris made history by being the first Olympics to include women. This year, Paris saw another first—total equity in the number of male and female athletes participating in the games! And women's sports in general continue to make great strides, with game attendance, tv-viewership rates and female athletes' salaries making huge gains and hitting all-time highs.

Other numbers also show reason for hope. The World Bank tracks a measurement called human capital, which is a way of predicting a country's economic progress and development success. According to their most recent report, girls' human capital is now equivalent to or higher than boys in 90% of the countries for which they have data. They have also seen a steady increase in the proportion of seats held by women in national parliaments, more than doubling over the last 25 years.

My last bit of good news hits closer to home. I was contacted recently by the executors of the estate of Elaine and Oris Possin. Elaine was the only woman in her chemistry program at UW-Madison and went on to be a legendary chemistry teacher at BDHS. She was also one of the founders of Peace Lutheran Church in Beaver Dam and a dedicated AAUW member. She and Oris were major contributors to the BDACT, among other local projects. And she was the mastermind behind decades of successful BDHS proms. She is fondly remembered for her intelligence, kindness and leadership.

Thanks to Elaine and Oris, we will be receiving a gift of \$3,000 this year. They have also set up a continuing fund with Beaver Dam Area Community Foundation which will give smaller grants each year in perpetuity. We will receive one of these grants every year, along with two other local groups, Peace Lutheran and Alpha Xi. Later this year our membership will discuss and vote on how we want to spend this gift. Think about how you would like to use this expression of Elaine and Oris's remarkable generosity.

With such good news to start us off, the coming year can't help but be a big success. I look forward to seeing you all soon, Bobbi.
