I have selected this year's beneficiary as Noble Clinic. There are many Noble clinics throughout Wisconsin and this continues to expand. It has grown from its humble beginnings in the 1960s as a community-led effort in the Wild Rose/Wautoma area to help migrant farm workers. Today it serves entire communities with diverse and comprehensive healthcare needs. The health center provides accessible medical, dental, and behavioral health care to all. They accept many insurance types, offer a Sliding Fee Scale discount program and are willing to work with people who have difficulty paying for care. Brochures will be available at meetings. The community outreach worker is Laura Goral and the community engagement coordinator is Emily Deiringer.

Personal care items and diapers are often needed by clients. Please generously donate these at each of our monthly meetings. Sometimes people come in who have not eaten for a long time, and cash donations will be used to provide Aldi gift cards and taxi vouchers. This partnership aims to strengthen the clinic's ability to serve the local community, ensuring that essential resources are available to meet patient needs. The AAUW sponsorship reflects a shared commitment to improving healthcare access and outcomes in the Beaver Dam area.

Our Scholarship Gift Basket Auction was a huge success with a net profit of \$8,367.60!! We had 89 people registered (30 members and 59 guests), with 36 live auction baskets which raised \$4,450 and 11 silent auction baskets which raised \$715. Books brought in \$202. And donations came in at \$2,768. That total comes to \$8,135. We make a little money on the meals and then there are a few expenses with paying the auctioneer and making copies, which makes the grand total \$8,367.60. Members really outdid themselves with making the beautiful baskets, as well as giving such generous donations. Several baskets were donated by members of the community, plus our Beaver Dam businesses once again were generous with the gift cards and/or baskets.
