Our district is leading the way to asking AAUW national to approve a two year pilot program to extend membership beyond our current criteria. This is an effort to recognize the challenges of receiving a degree given financial issues, rural locations, and reduction of community campuses.

In my opinion, this is an important step in honoring the gifts women bring to our communities, state, and nation. While the train moves slowly on change, let's chug along to a renewed sense of purpose that is more inclusive.

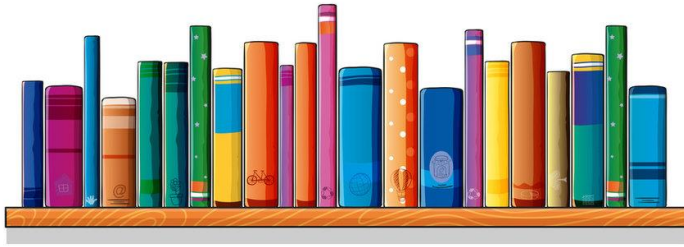

The AAUW-WI Public Policy Committee meets monthly via Zoom to talk about state and national politics that affect our members and mission. One recent area of great concern has been the dismantling of the U.S. Department of Education by the current administration.

The Department of Education (DoE) is undergoing major restructuring under the Trump administration, shifting functions to other departments (Labor, State, HHS) to downsize the federal role and empower states. This is impacting K-12, postsecondary, and Native American programs, while also introducing new AI initiatives, streamlining student loan rules, and launching other new initiatives, signaling **a significant federal pullback in direct education oversight and spending**. Trump's "One Big Beautiful Bill" which passed Congress this summer, not only cut SNAP and Medicaid funding, which have impacts for schools, but also created a federal private school voucher program.

Education has always been one of our core AAUW values. We believe education is a powerful catalyst for opportunity — but persistent barriers continue to hold women and girls back. From civil rights rollbacks and rising tuition to disproportionate debt and campus discrimination, systemic obstacles threaten access and equity at every level. AAUW works to remove those barriers and advance inclusive, affordable, and equitable education, because when women learn without obstacles, entire communities thrive.
